I was first introduced to Rotary in 1996 in Vancouver. I was working for the accounting firm Grant Thornton and was on the Board of Directors of the Chamber of Commerce. The Chamber had a really close relationship with the local Rotary club. I got involved and was very impressed by their sense of fellowship and fun, and wanted Rotary to become a part of my life.

Food Sector Emergency Plan to be released on April 1, 2025

In the early days of the pandemic emergency, food providers in Calgary formed a collaborative to share and coordinate a response. RCCD and other Rotary clubs donated to various agencies within the collaborative. At the same time Rotary Clubs and Vibrant Communities Calgary formed a food security committee to develop a more systematic response. The committee work resulted in the launch of Bread in November 2024 to improve access to emergency food seekers in Calgary.

RCCD joined YYC Food Collaborative in 2022 and serves on its Stewardship Group. The

Collaborative has two foci: immediate needs and root cause of food insecurity. Learning from the Covid experience, the collaborative has been working on a food sector emergency plan. Meals on Wheels and the Calgary Food Bank have provided staff leadership to drafting the plan. This plan under the umbrella of the Calgary Emergency Management Agency(CEMA) will coordinate response during major crises such as a flood or pandemic. The plan will be released on April 1, 2025 at the Calgary Food Bank.

RCCD's participation and support aligns with food security- one of the club's funding areas of focus. Increasing and improving food security is a multi-faceted and complex issues. Only through collaboration and engagement of the many community stakeholders, including Rotary can progress be made.

Human Milk Bank Project in Aurangabad, India

We recently received an update about the usage of the Human Milk Bank facility in the state hospital in Aurangabad, India which our club generously supported – and it spurred me to writing about this successful project.

About 10 years ago, I went on a Rotary Friendship Exchange to India with some dozen other Rotarians from our District. It was a wonderful experience, giving us the chance to stay in the homes of Indian Rotarians, attend their meetings, visit their service projects and be shown their tourist attractions. Some years later one of them reached out to request financial support for this proposed project. For the first time their club applied for a Global Grant, and they asked our club to become the designated international partner – which we did. There is a similar Milk Bank operating in Calgary.

In 2019 Bob and I had the chance to visit the site to confirm exactly what they were planning to do.




Of course the next thing to happen was COVID! So the project got delayed. Then the local government decided to build a new wing of the hospital and put the Human Milk Bank there when it was built – so that delayed it still further.

I'm delighted to say the project was finally finished in May last year, and the Global Grant successfully finalized.

Since then, the Rotarian champion of the project (Hemant Langde, a local travel agent on the extreme left in the picture) has sent us updates about its usage on a regular basis whilst expressing the very heartfelt gratitude of their club for our support. Each month almost 40 litres of human milk is donated. This is distributed for 125 babies whose mothers cannot supply enough life- saving human milk for their very small or sick baby; none is discarded.

This project makes a big difference in the lives of these vulnerable babies and their mothers – and it was, or maybe still is, the first in this highly populated area of India.
